

**TAKE THE KIDS TO THESE SPOTS IN SOUTH SACRAMENTO CITY/COUNTY  
BRING A GRABBER AND GARBAGE BAG TO PICK UP ANY LITTER YOU RUN ACROSS**

Children should always be supervised by adults when exploring a creek or open space area. You may want to assess the site in advance to be aware of any hazards. Hazards might include stagnant water with toxic algal blooms (July – September), campers (needles, dogs, human waste, etc); poison oak or thistles, steep banks, deep water, etc. If children get in the water, it is important that they wash up immediately. Because our creeks receive stormwater runoff, they contain pollutants picked up from roads, parking lots and landscaped areas.

[Old City Cemetery](#) is a wonderful place to visit. It is an outdoor museum containing historical gravesites and statues, beautiful landscaping, roads, and walking paths. Its trees contribute to the relaxing environment by providing shade and muffling sounds from nearby streets. The California Native Plant Society has planted and maintains many native plantings here. [William Land Regional Park](#) has more to offer than the Zoo and Fairytale Town. Park at the Rock Garden near the Fairytale Town Parking lot above the amphitheater. There are several trails to explore in the small Rock Garden. The wide variety of plants attract all kinds of birds and insects. [Garcia Bend Park](#)  
The nature area is at the back of the park along the Sacramento River levee. This park connects to the Pocket Canal Sacramento River Parkway. 7654 Pocket Rd. Sacramento, CA 95831 [Map Link](#)

[Reichmuth Park](#)

[North Laguna Creek Wetlands](#) Park on Jacinto Blvd. The nature trail is on the south side of the creek and can be reached by crossing the footbridge. The trail also branches south into open space within the City of Elk Grove. This is mostly an open area, so best to avoid in the summer.
